


The High Holy Days are on their way!

Big Hug

The Jewish People needs a big hug.

We've needed it for a long, long time.

I have been sensing this all summer. Actually, I have been sensing this for years now, but most acutely since Hamas attacked Israel on October 7 nearly two years ago.

The words from Ecclesiastes' third chapter, the ones popularized in the folk/rock classic "Turn, Turn, Turn" over 50 years ago, have been spinning in my mind:

A time of love, a time of hate
A time of war, a time of peace
A time you may embrace

A time to refrain from embracing

In a world where there has been too much hatred, too much fighting, and too much distancing, we are due for a time of embracing.

And if this is true for our world as a whole, our people in particular needs a big hug.

The Torah features a moment where a big hug takes place. It happens when Jacob returns to the land of Israel. His homecoming was anything but easy, even though he returns with a sizeable family and significant wealth. Waiting for him at "home" – a place he hasn't been in decades – is his twin brother Esau. Jacob and Esau had a turbulent childhood. Esau sold Jacob his birthright but flew into a rage when Jacob deceptively asked for and

received the blessing-of-the-firstborn from his father.

With Jacob returning to where he grew up, what would happen next? There was no way to know if the fight he avoided by fleeing to another land would continue, or not.

When the two are together, they could have wrestled. Instead, they embraced. They give one another a big hug.

This story is imperfect for our times. But it also fits, especially as Rosh Hashanah 5786 takes place at the end of this month. We are not the only ones who are feeling that we've been through too much for any one person to handle during this past year.

So, let's be there for one another. Let's do our part to enhance our connections within the Temple community and among Am Yisrael (the Jewish people) as a whole.

Let's make this a year of kindness, understanding, and - above all - embrace. Let's make it a time when we give and receive that big hug that we need. L'shanah tovah.

New Expanded Kesher High Program!

In addition to our ongoing Kesher High programs (Madrichim Kesher teaching assistant program, L'taken Social Justice Weekend, and March of the Living), we are thrilled to announce a new, collaborative learning program for ALL our Greensboro Jewish teens to learn together!

Your teen can choose to participate in any or ALL of the four major programs we have at Kesher High with their registration! Kesher High is for all Temple Emanuel teens in 8th - 12th grade!

Beginning this fall, in addition to our ongoing programs, we will offer a weekly, Jewish learning program for 8th - 12th grades. This new offering will give teens a space to explore big questions, deepen their Jewish knowledge, and connect with

Greensboro Jewish peers who share their curiosity. This will be a partnership between Beth David and Temple Emanuel and will be open to any Jewish teen in the area.

We are calling this pilot program Kehillah High. Kehillah means community and that is exactly our goal - bring together our Greensboro Jewish teens for meaningful learning and connection, especially at this moment in our community and world.

Kehillah High sessions will be interactive, discussion-based, and relevant to the lives our teens are living right now. We'll explore topics like:

- What Judaism says about friendship, wellness, and Jewish identity
- How ancient wisdom speaks to modern dilemmas

As this is a pilot program, we'll be gathering feedback from teens and families to shape the experience together. Our goal is to create something meaningful, fun, and lasting - rooted in Jewish tradition and tailored to today's teens.

Kehillah High will meet on Sunday evenings and will include a vegetarian dinner. A Kehillah High calendar is forthcoming in September. Our first semester of Kehillah High will launch formally on Sunday, October 26, 2025, at Beth David

Synagogue, with the second semester being held at Temple Emanuel. Madrichim will start on Sunday, September 7, which is opening day of Kesher!

Chaveriut Committee Bus Tour

On June 22, thirty-five Temple Emanuel newcomers enjoyed a chartered bus tour around Greensboro. The tour, sponsored by the Chaveirut Committee, revealed how the Jewish Community is woven into our city. We rode by the Greensboro Jewish Federation, the Guilford College Campus, and the Guilford Courthouse National Military Park. We learned how many Jewish families, like the Kaplans, Cones and Franks, have contributed to industries, colleges, and healthcare in Greensboro. As we drove by Cone hospital, we heard about its origin and contributions to our community. We traveled downtown by the Temple's Greene Street campus and pivoted in the center of town to look at the Tanger Center for the Performing Arts, LeBauer Park, the Miriam Brenner Children's Museum and the Public Library, designed by Edward Lowenstein. As we drove past the International Civil Rights Museum, we heard about the "A&T Four" sit-in that sparked the sit-in movement. We went past the Carolina Theater where the Betty & Ben Cone Auditorium is located (showing the annual production of Wizard of Oz). We heard about the contributions of Jewish families to the aviation industry in Greensboro. The tour ended at "The Women of the Shoah Memorial" to hear the wonderful artist and sculptor, Victoria Milstein, talk about and describe the memorial.

There was much more...Greensboro has been so enriched by the Jewish community, and our newcomers got a taste of it!

Social Action News

The Temple Emanuel Social Action Committee, in coordination with the Interfaith Immigrant Justice Coalition of Greensboro, has approved offering support to a young family who has escaped violence from their countries of origin. Now new parents to a 3-month-old baby, the married couple was independent and self-supporting until recent executive orders caused the father to lose his permit to work. Paying for basic necessities, which include rent, groceries, and utilities, has become a major challenge. Our goal is to assist this family in reestablishing their independence so they can once again thrive on their own. The family needs temporary financial support and may need assistance with other issues as they arise. We have begun forming a team and have started raising funds. The projected time frame for this initiative is between six and twelve months with an evaluation of needs every three months.




