

It gets very frustrating after a lot of tries, phone calls, adding and removing apps, walking away and coming back and even saying some words we may regret. Hopefully we keep trying until, finally, we get connected.

Temple life can be like that. You join, people reach out, you come to some services, and participate in events. But sometimes those connections falter or get broken. This can happen for so many reasons. Our kids leave ECEC and enter the public school system, they graduate and no longer attend Kesher (formerly TERS), or we become empty nesters. We all have other demands like work and caring for

family members, and we've been through the separation and strain caused by the pandemic. We may even have had a disagreement over an issue or felt our ideas were not valued.

I'm here to say please reconnect with Temple Emanuel! It's worth the effort. Come to Shabbat services in person or online. Come to a meeting or event. Join a committee or an adult education class. Dates and times are on the calendar in this bulletin. You could even fold the bulletins or cook and donate food for the Chesed committee. There are dozens of ways to connect. Let's work together to find your connection point. It could be a young adult group, empty nesters, Sisterhood, Brotherhood, Music, Torah study. FROM RABBI KOREN



The Jewish people have many timehonored tools for articulating our hopes and constructing blessings.

One of the more creative ways of doing this is to take the number of the Hebrew year minus the thousands place (783 for

the coming Hebrew year) and then find other Hebrew words which have the same numerical value. Here are a few examples recently shared by a Rabbinic colleague:

לזמן ששון

(liz'man sasson) – "To a time of rejoicing." In the wake of the challenges of the past months and even years, we look forward to a time when our calendars will be inundated with celebrations. May every day open opportunities to rejoice and be grateful for the good with which we, and the world around us, are blessed.

הבא עלינו ברכה ושלום

(ha-ba aleinu b'racha v'shalom) – "May blessing and peace come to all of us." Let this be the year when war ends and all can experience peace. May this be true for us and our town, state, and country. May it be so for Ukraine and other places where battles rage, for Israel, and for all humanity. May our entire planet be blessed with healing. May we share our blessings in our families, in our communities, and globally.

Community Milestones

Two other numbers of significance should not be overlooked as 5783 begins.

The first is the number 115. Temple Emanuel began with a dozen families gathering together 115 years ago for the High Holidays of 1907. They could have only dreamed that one day their Temple, and Greensboro as a whole, would grow into what it is today. As we start this new year, we do so with nearly 600 families. For 115 years, our Temple and its leaders have played a key role locally and have also had an impact well beyond central North Carolina. We have an incredible history. As Jews, we hold to the belief that our best days are still ahead of us.

The second number that stands out is 20. It has now been 20 years since Temple Emanuel dedicated our Jefferson Road campus.

Construction was completed in 2002 in time for the celebration of the High Holidays making this Rosh Hashanah a true milestone in our Temple's recent history.

I, for one, will never forget interviewing for Temple in the spring of 2003. It was impressive to see a community

that had a newly-constructed home as well as a historical campus located near the heart of downtown. Yet, many of the places I spoke with had nice buildings. What truly stood out for me, what convinced me that Greensboro was for us as a family, were the people that called our Temple "home." That continues to be the case even until this very day.

Thank you to everyone who makes our Temple so special. On behalf of Michal and our kids, I wish you and yours a Happy 20th, a Joyous 115th, and a 5783 filled with blessing and meaning.

FROM EARLY CHILDHOOD



SHALOM CHAVERIM!

The beginning of the school year signals the beginning of many things: meeting new friends and families, observing children

becoming friends, setting rules and expectations, implementing new ideas and activities—the list goes on. It's fitting, then, that Rosh Hashanah occurs during the month of September. Rosh Hashanah literally translates to "Head of the Year." Rosh Hashanah is a time when we reflect on our feelings and actions and consider how they we may enter the new year with the best of intentions.

Like most holidays, Rosh Hashanah is associated with certain symbols, all of which can be used to inspire extended activities within our classrooms. Symbols of Rosh Hashanah include apples, honey, challah, pomegranates, and the shofar. Apples and honey are eaten as a way of welcoming a "sweet year". Challah is baked as a round loaf during Rosh Hashanah to symbolize the circle of time and may also be dipped in honey.

Pomegranate seeds represent abundance, or at least the wish for it, and the shofar is sounded as a call for us to "wake up".

Here are some ways we will introduce some welcome back to school activities, intertwined with High Holidays activities in our classrooms.

And don't forget that you can try all of these wonderful activities at home as well.

- 1. Review classroom rules and expectations. Ask the children to list ways they can meet these expectations. Write down what they say and post the list in your room. Explain that remembering the rules will help everyone kick off the new year with a good start.
- 2. Bake challah. Invite the children to help prepare the ingredients. Talk with the children about why the challah is round, discuss other

- 3. Sample apples, pomegranates, or any fruit of interest to the children. Bring in a variety of apples for the children to try. First discuss how they are visually similar and different. Have the children make predictions about how each apple will taste. Make a graph and vote on their favorites afterward. How many of your children have tried pomegranates? Isn't it strange that we eat the seeds instead of the flesh? Cutting and eating a pomegranate is an experience in and of itself for small children. Invite the children to make guesses about how many seeds are inside a single pomegranate. Write down what they say and count the seeds together. Cut open and display a pomegranate and encourage the children to draw what they see. Talk about and display their observations.
- 4. Dip challah and fruit in honey. Talk about bees and other pollinators. Just like apples, honey comes in many varieties. Why are there so many types of honey? Is it because of the types of plants the bees pollinated or where the plants and bees are located? Is honey always the same color? Bring in samples of a few types of honey. Talk with children about what they see. Let them sample some and ask them how each variety tastes. Talk about the parts of bee and the bee life cycle. Introduce other pollinators like butterflies, moths, and flies. Diagram the parts of a flower. Invite a beekeeper to the school.
- 5. Make shofars. Print and share pictures of shofars with the children. Talk about its significance as an instrument of welcoming and celebration. Practice playing the shofars loudly and quietly and fast and slow.

May your year be as sweet as the laughter of children.
